- **Keep a Daily Journal:** Track your productivity, mood, sleep quality, and any negative effects (like dry mouth, headaches, or hunger suppression). Memory can be unreliable when trying to summarize a whole week of experiences for your nurse.
- **Purchase a Reliable Blood Pressure Monitor:** Your prescriber will require accurate weekly readings of your high blood pressure and heart rate. Buy a validated upper-arm monitor rather than a wrist one.
- **Manage Expectations:** Titration is seldom a straight line. You may experience a dose that makes you feel jittery, or one that seems like it not does anything at all. This is all normal data for your prescriber.
- **Focus On Sleep and Nutrition:** Stimulant medications can reduce appetite and interrupt sleep if taken too late. Consume regular meals (even if you aren't starving) and take your medication early in the early morning.
- **Communicate Honestly:** Do not attempt to "difficult out" uncomfortable adverse effects. Let your nurse understand immediately if something feels incorrect.
