Detailed DIY Door Repairs

1. Repairing a Sagging Door

2. Removing Squeaks

- Unlock and tap the hinge pin upward utilizing a nail and a hammer.
- Clean the pin clean with a rag to get rid of old, dirty grease.
- Cover the pin lightly with a multi-purpose lubricant or petroleum jelly.
- Reinsert the pin and swing the door back and forth a few times to disperse the lubricant.

3. Changing a Misaligned Latch

If your door declines to remain shut, the latch isn't lining up appropriately with the hole in the strike plate.

- **The Lipstick Trick:** Rub a bit of lipstick or chalk on the door latch. Shut the door and attempt to lock it. The mark left behind on the door frame will reveal you precisely where the latch is hitting.
- **The Fix:** Use a file to widen the strike plate hole, or loosen the strike plate and move it slightly up or to match the lock.
