

Choosing the right horse feed for older ponies with poor teeth is mainly about helping them eat more easily, maintaining complete nutrition, and preserving body condition without causing gut disturbance. As ponies age, dental issues can reduce chewing ability, which means the feed has to do more of the work. The best options are usually tender, tasty, high fibre feeds that are easy to eat, low in starch, and suitable for senior nutrition.

- Soft texture or easy-soak format
- Low starch and high fibre content
- Good palatability

- Balanced minerals and vitamins

Best types of horse feed for ponies with chewing difficulties

For ponies that find chewing hard, the most practical horse feed options are usually those that can be soaked, prepared with added water, or quickly become soft into a safe texture. Different feeds meet different needs, and the most practical option often brings together several options.

Mash

Senior mash is a common choice for older ponies with poor teeth because it is simple to soak and becomes soft quickly. A mash can be very palatable, which helps with hard-to-please ponies or ponies that have started refusing harder feeds. It can also contribute to hydration because it contains extra water once prepared.

Mash works well as a base for small meals, especially when you want to add feed additives or chopped fibre. Choose a formulation that is starch-reduced and designed for senior nutrition rather than a sweet wet feed.

Sugar beet

Sugar beet is a useful fibre source because it is easily digested and easy to chew once soaked. It is often added to horse feed plans for older ponies because it gives steady energy without the need for much chewing. It also helps produce a softer feed, which can be especially useful when teeth are worn or missing.

Because sugar beet must be prepared correctly, always soak before feeding and follow the manufacturer's instructions. Used properly, it can be a useful component of a balanced ration.

Chaff

Chaff provides fibre and can help add bulk to a feed, but it should be chosen carefully for a pony with chewing problems. Fine, soft chaff is usually preferable to coarse, stalky products. It can be mixed with soaked feed or senior horse feed to make the mix easier to eat and reduce the effort needed to chew.

Chaff is useful when you want a feed with a forage feel that still feels comforting. It supports the idea of forage first and can help the pony take longer to eat, but it should not be too firm or scratchy.

Cubes

Soaked cubes can be an very good option if the pony tolerates them well. Once softened, they provide a manageable texture and can be easier to feed than dry nuts or harder blends. Cubes are often used alongside mash, sugar beet, or chaff to build a more complete ration.

If you select cubes, be sure they are appropriate for aged ponies and can be moistened enough to ease chewing strain. That can be especially helpful for ponies with lost teeth or serious dental issues.

Both complete horse feed and a home made blend can be effective, but the best choice depends on the pony's demands, appetite, and the amount of control you need over ingredients. A blend can be beneficial if the pony needs a certain texture or if you want to adapt the horse feed more closely.
