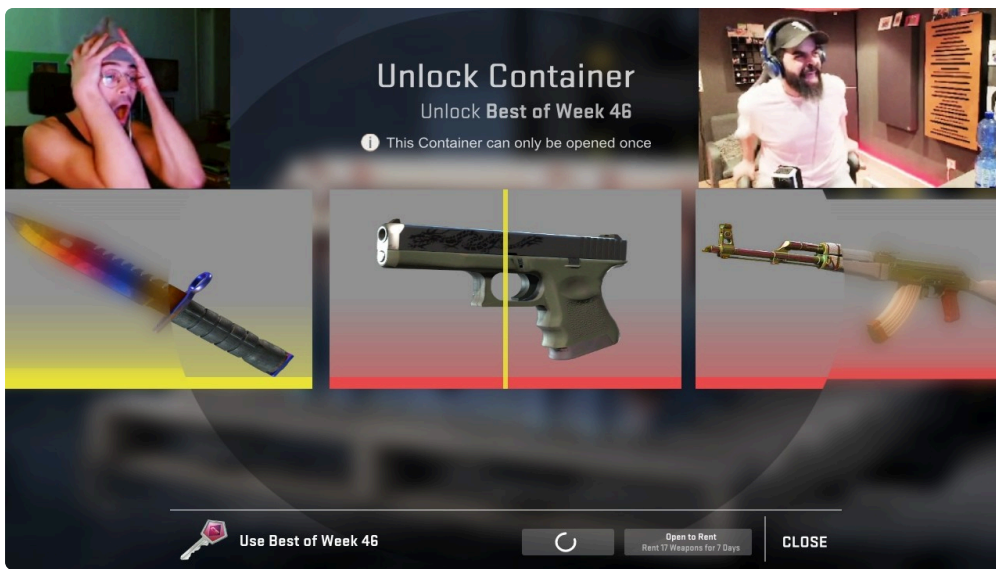
1. **Authorities Valve Store**-- The safest and most trustworthy source. Keys are sold at a fixed rate of £ 2.50 GBP (topic to local taxes).
2. **Steam Community Market**-- Allows users to list keys for sale. Prices are market-driven and can be lower than Valve's rate, however validate seller reputation.
3. **Third-Party Marketplaces** (e.g., G2A, Kinguin, DMarket)-- Often provide discount rates, however transactions are outside Valve's TOS. Use respectable sellers to prevent frauds.
4. **In-Game Trading**-- Some gamers trade keys directly for other skins. Constantly validate the trade through Steam's main trade window.

Understanding the Odds: Probability and Rarity

Each case consists of skins of numerous rarity tiers. While the precise algorithm is proprietary, community-aggregated data gives an affordable photo of the chances:

- **Stay Informed About Market Trends**-- Prices for uncommon skins can escalate after a case is retired. Watching on market cycles can help you time purchases.
