The Technology Behind CS2 Casinos: Provably Fair Gaming

Among the primary concerns for users on third-party gambling websites is whether the video games are rigged. To fight suspicion, trusted CS2 casinos use a system called **Provably Fair**.

Provably fair algorithms permit players to independently verify the fairness of every bet, spin, or crash multiplier. This is usually accomplished through cryptographic hashing:

- The site produces a secret server seed before the video game starts and provides the gamer with a hashed variation of it.
- The player's browser produces a client seed.
