

Alto, Georgia does not announce itself with a skyline or a long list of famous addresses. It speaks more quietly, through its older streets, the rhythm of local churches and civic buildings, the neighborhoods that have grown around schools and family businesses, and the kind of work that keeps a town looking cared for rather than merely occupied. In a place like Alto, history is not confined to a museum wall. It lives in the framing of a century-old house, the pitch of a church roof, the metal covering over a small commercial building, and the repairs that keep those structures ready for another season of Georgia weather.
