In addition to the basic wear and rarity tiers, any weapon pulled from a case has a roughly **10% opportunity** of being a StatTrak™ variation. These products include a small digital counter connected to the weapon body that

tracks the number of eliminates made with it. StatTrak items generally command a higher price on the free market.

Popular Cases Throughout CS History

Over a years, Valve has released dozens of cases. Some have actually defined ages of the game, while others are treasured for their sentimental worth or high-tier knife finishes.

- **The Arms Deal Collection (2013):** Where all of it began. Including the renowned AWP|Asiimov and the initial set of knife finishes, these early cases are now considered unusual collector's items.
- **Chroma Case (2015):** Introduced the Doppler, Marble Fade, and Tiger Tooth knife surfaces, which remain staples of high-tier trading today.
- **Prisma Case (2019):** Highly popular for introducing Horizon knives with lively color plans like Gamma Doppler.
- **Fracture Case (2020):** Known for presenting the Shattered Web knives into regular drop swimming pools, making popular designs more available.

The Economics of Unboxing: Should You Open Cases?

From a simply mathematical perspective, **opening CS: GO cases is an unfavorable EV (Expected Value) proposition.**

Because the vast majority of items dropped are Mil-Spec (Blue) or Restricted (Purple) skins worth only a few cents, the average monetary return on a £ 2.50 key is considerably lower than the cost.

Drift Values and Skin Condition

When you open a case, the item you receive is assigned a **Float Value** in between 0.00 and 1.00. This float dictates the wear condition of the skin. **CSGO Case**

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Minimal to no scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight wear on edges)
- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable scratches and fading)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavy damage, in some cases exposing entirely different textures)

Certain skins look extraordinary even in Battle-Scarred condition (often called "blackimovs"), while others look horrible unless they are Factory New. Drift worth plays a huge function in identifying an item's secondary market cost.
