2. Crash

3. Live roulette

Similar to standard casino live roulette, however typically adapted with 3 results (red, black, and green/multiplier) represented by CS2 skin colors or group logos.

4. Coinflip

A simple 1v1 game where 2 players wager skins or credits of approximately equal worth. The system flips a virtual coin, and the winner takes the entire pot (minus a little website commission, referred to as the "rake").

5. Jackpot

Numerous players deposit skins into a main swimming pool. A virtual timer counts down, and a winner is picked through a lotto system. The greater the worth of the skins a gamer deposits, the higher their analytical chance of winning the whole pot.

Security, Risks, and Security Measures

Because CS2 gambling sites run outside of Valve's direct control, users must work out severe care. Engaging with these platforms carries numerous significant threats:

- **Scams and Phishing:** Fake websites often mimic popular gambling platforms to take Steam login credentials or high-tier inventory products.
- **Absence of Consumer Protection:** Since many sites operate in legal grey locations, users who encounter technical problems, locked funds, or unfair restrictions have little recourse through traditional legal channels.
- **Danger of Addiction:** The busy nature of skin gambling, integrated with the psychological allure of unboxing rare products, can cause problem gambling.

- **Protect Connections:** Ensure the URL uses HTTPS and functions appropriate SSL certificates.
- **Active Support:** Reliable platforms usually use 24/7 client support via live chat or a ticketing system.

Best Practices for Safe Participation
