As highlighted above, your house or the RNG (Random Number Generator) dictates when a crash takes place. A round can crash instantly at 1.00 x, destroying anybody who did not respond in milliseconds.

Why Do Players Risk Their Skins?

The skin economy operates differently than fiat currency. To many gamers, a digital knife worth £ 300 feels less tangible than a £ 300 costs in their physical wallet. This abstraction of worth decreases the psychological barrier to gambling. Furthermore, skin crash sites provide several special features:
