If you are experiencing repeating crashes, work through the following troubleshooting actions systematically.

1. Confirm the Integrity of Game Files

With time, video game files can become corrupted due to unanticipated system shutdowns, insufficient updates, or defective storage drives. Steam has a built-in tool to examine and replace missing or broken files.

- Open the **Steam Library**.
- Right-click on **CS: GO** and choose **Properties**.
- Navigate to the **Local Files** tab.
- Click **Verify Integrity of Game Files**.
- Wait on the procedure to surface (Steam will automatically download any damaged files), then reboot your computer system.

2. Update or Roll Back Graphics Drivers

3. Change Launch Options

- Go to your Steam Library, right-click **CS: GO**, and choose **Properties**.
- Under the **General** tab, try to find **Launch Options**.
- Get in the following suggested stable commands (separated by spaces):
 - -novid (Skips the intro video, minimizing load-time crashes)
 - -high (Sets CS: GO to high CPU top priority)
 - -autoconfig (Resets video and efficiency settings to default if the video game declines to launch)

4. Run the Game as Administrator

Permissions issues can sometimes avoid CS: GO from accessing required system files or saving configuration modifications.

- Browse to your CS: GO setup folder (typically C: \ Program Files (x86)\ Steam \ steamapps \ typical \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive).
- Find the main executable file (csgo.exe).

5. Inspect for Background Application Interference

- Discord Overlay
- NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay
- RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS) and MSI Afterburner
- Third-party antivirus software (attempt adding an exemption for the Steam folder)

Advanced Troubleshooting

If basic fixes stop working to deal with the problem, the issue might lie deeper within your operating system or hardware configuration.

1. Managing Overclocks and XMP Profiles

While overclocking your CPU, GPU, or RAM offers an efficiency boost, CS: GO is notoriously delicate to hardware instability.



- If you have actually applied an aggressive overclock, try calling it back to standard factory requirements.
- If you are running high-speed RAM, test disabling your motherboard's **XMP (Extreme Memory Profile)** or **DOCP** in the BIOS to see if memory instability is triggering the crashes.

2. Reinstalling CS: GO Cleanly

Sometimes, remaining customized maps, out-of-date workshop items, or heavily modified configuration files trigger persistent disputes.

- Uninstall CS: GO through Steam.
- By hand browse to the installation directory (... steamapps \ typical \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive) and delete any remaining folders.
- Re-install a fresh copy of the game.
