Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Considerable wear, fading colors, and heavy scratching.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Incredibly worn, in some cases altering the graphic entirely. <i>(Note: Some skins look uniquely cool in BS, referred to as "Blackscars").</i>

StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™**: Items with this innovation feature an orange LED counter that tracks the variety of confirmed eliminates made with that specific weapon.
- **Memento Packages**: These are dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors) and feature gold sticker labels representing the groups and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve organizes CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which determine how regularly they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Customer Grade (White):** Common, fundamental drops.
2. **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly better than Consumer, typical in containers.
3. **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard lower-tier case drops.
4. **Restricted (Purple):** Often forms the base components for trade-ups.
