Stimulant vs. Non-Stimulant Titration Timelines

Non-Stimulants (e.g., Atomoxetine, Guanfacine)	Weight-based or low repaired dose	2 to 4 weeks	Tiredness, nausea, lightheadedness, gastrointestinal changes, mood changes.

Note: Non-stimulants normally take longer to show complete therapeutic results and need a more steady titration schedule compared to fast-acting stimulants.
