Valve also executed trade cooldowns (items traded can not be re-traded for 7 days) to disrupt the fast flow of skins utilized in gambling networks.

Nevertheless, the environment is durable. When one site closes, several others emerge, typically utilizing cryptocurrency intermediaries to bypass direct Steam inventory transfers.

Best Practices and Safety Tips
