1. Outside Wear Conditions

A skin's exterior condition does not degrade through use; rather, it is arbitrarily designated when the skin is unboxed or dropped, and it stays static permanently. The five main wear conditions are:

- **Factory New (FN):** Pristine condition with little to no visible blemishes.
- **Very Little Wear (MW):** Slight scratches or small paint breaking, normally only noticeable upon close assessment.

2. Weapon Rarities

Skins are classified into various rarity tiers, which dictate their drop rates in-game or from weapon cases:

Rarity Tier Color Code Description **Customer Grade** White Typical, standard weapon surfaces. **Industrial Grade** Light Blue Slightly uncommon drops. **Mil-Spec** Dark Blue Standard tier discovered in a lot of weapon cases. **Restricted** Purple Higher-tier items, typically serving as trade-up food. **Classified** Pink Rare, highly sought-after weapon finishes. **Covert** Red The highest basic weapon tier in cases (omitting knives/gloves). **Amazing** Gold Incredibly uncommon items, consisting of Knives and Gloves.

Float Values and Pattern Indices

Beyond wear conditions, two covert technical metrics greatly influence a skin's rate: **Float Value** and **Pattern Index**.

- **Float Value:** A decimal number between 0.00 and 1.00 that dictates the exact wear of a skin. For example, a skin may be "Field-Tested," however if its float is 0.1501, it is best on the border of Minimal Wear and will command a greater price than a Field-Tested skin with a float of 0.37.
- **Pattern Index:** Many skins feature procedural generation, implying the texture is mapped in a different way depending upon a seed number (1 to 1000). Famous examples consist of the *Case Hardened* series, where specific seed numbers produce huge quantities of blue on the weapon surface area ("Blue Gems"), driving prices up greatly.

How to Acquire CS2 Skins

There are a number of main approaches for developing a CS2 inventory, each with its own pros and cons:

1. **In-Game Drops:** Simply playing on authorities or community servers grants weekly care bundles including weapon drops, graffiti, or cases.
2. **Opening Cases:** Players can purchase keys to open weapon cases. While this uses the thrill of possibly unpacking an uncommon knife, the odds are greatly stacked against the player.

- **Usage Steam Guard:** Always have two-factor authentication enabled through the Steam Mobile Authenticator.
