Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Visible wear, scratches, and fading. The most common condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Substantial wear, heavy scratching, and obvious paint chipping.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Incredibly used, rusted, or faded. Often valued for unique "blackimov" impacts.

Keep in mind: Some skins are "capped," suggesting they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float versions exceptionally unusual and costly.
