How the UK Gambling Commission Defines These

The UK Gambling Commission (UKGC), which regulates all legal gambling in Great Britain, makes clear distinctions between different types of gambling offerings. These definitions affect licensing, game fairness standards, and advertising rules.

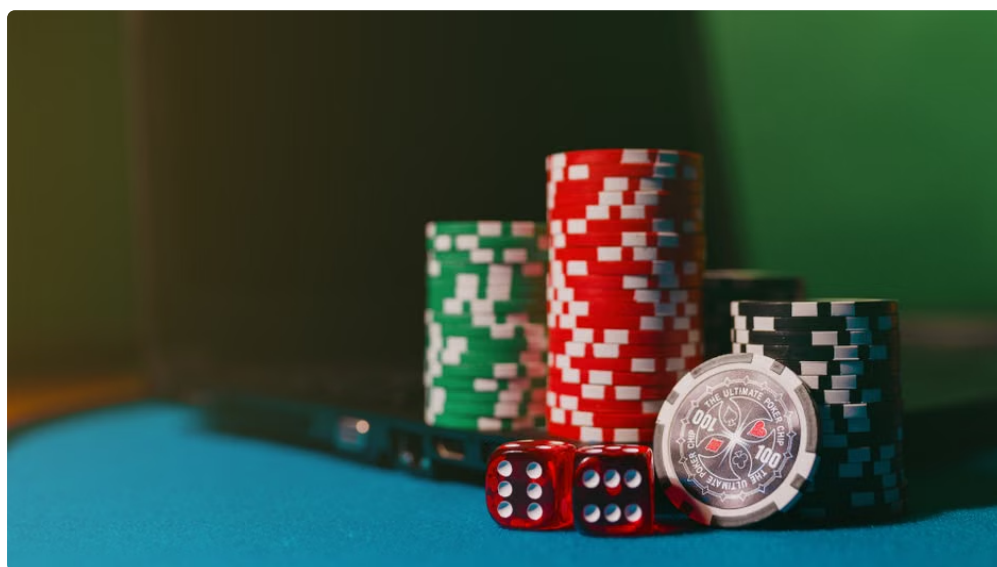
