Overconfidence and the Burden on the Favourites

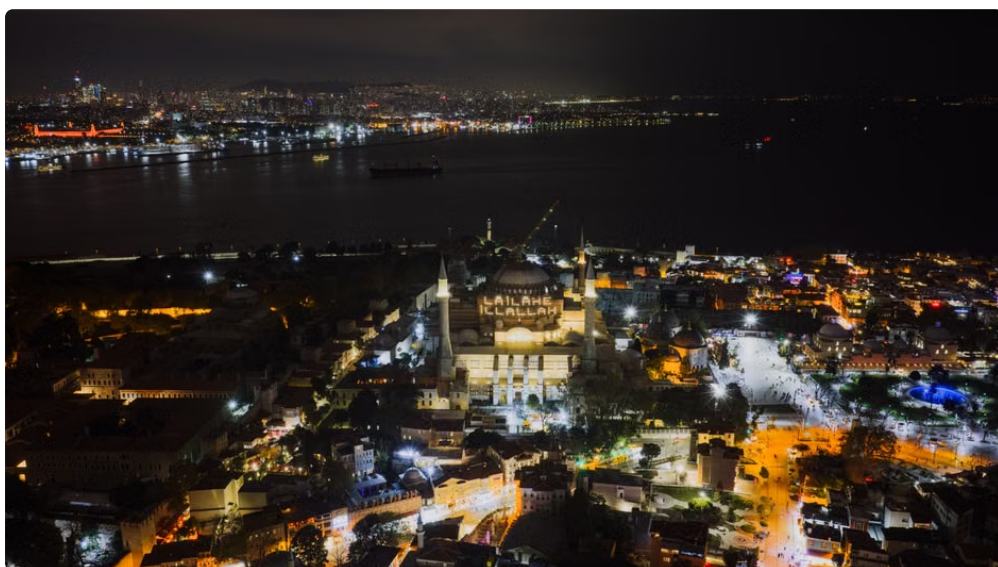
