

A windshield looks like a window until the day it proves it is not just a window. Most drivers think of it as the transparent thing that collects fingerprints, bug splatter, parking stickers, and the occasional tragic pebble from a gravel truck. Fair enough. It does all of that. But the windshield also plays a serious role in vehicle safety, structural integrity, and the correct operation of certain modern safety systems.
