- **Trade Hold Implementations:** To decrease the fast transfer of skins in between accounts, Valve presented a seven-day trade hang on products traded from user stocks. This seriously disrupted the instant-deposit and instant-withdrawal models that gambling sites relied upon.
- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has lawfully forced prominent platform operators to shut down their operations or pivot away from using Steam-related facilities.

Despite these measures, operators continue to adapt by using peer-to-peer marketplaces, alternative cryptocurrencies, and offshore licensing to keep their platforms running.
