- **Keep a Daily Journal:** Track your performance, state of mind, sleep quality, and any side impacts (like dry mouth, headaches, or hunger suppression). Memory can be unreliable when trying to sum up a whole week of experiences for your nurse.
- **Invest in a Reliable Blood Pressure Monitor:** Your prescriber will need precise weekly readings of your blood pressure and heart rate. Buy a validated upper-arm screen rather than a wrist one.
- **Handle Expectations:** Titration is hardly ever a straight line. You might experience a dose that makes you feel jittery, or one that feels like it does nothing at all. This is all normal data for your prescriber.
