2. Update Graphics Card Drivers

- **NVIDIA Users:** Download GeForce Experience or check out the main NVIDIA chauffeur download page. Carry out a "Clean Installation" if crashes continue.
- **AMD Users:** Use AMD Software: Adrenalin Edition to look for the current WHQL-certified chauffeur updates.

3. Clear Launch Options

While custom launch alternatives (like -novid or -high) can improve performance, out-of-date commands can conflict with video game updates and trigger immediate crashes upon start-up.



- **How to clear them:**

1. Go to Steam Library -> > Right-click **CS: GO** -> > **Properties**.
2. Under the **General** tab, look for the **Launch Options** text box.
3. Clear out all commands, or strip them down to the bare essentials (e.g., -novid).

4. Run the Game as Administrator

Permission issues can avoid the game from writing necessary cache files or engaging properly with anti-cheat software.

- **How to do it:**

1. Navigate to the setup folder (usually C: \ Program Files (x86)\ Steam \ steamapps \ common \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive).
2. Locate the primary executable file (csgo.exe).
3. Right-click the file, choose **Properties**, go to the **Compatibility** tab, and inspect **Run this program as an administrator**.
4. Click Apply and OK.

5. Look for Overheating and Hardware Instability

High frame rates press hardware to its limits. If parts run too hot, thermal throttling or emergency shutdowns will happen.

- Download hardware monitoring software application like **HWMonitor** or **MSI Afterburner**.
- Watch on CPU and GPU temperatures while playing. Temperatures regularly above 85 ° C (185 ° F) suggest poor ventilation, dust buildup, or stopping working thermal paste.
- If the PC is overclocked (through XMP/EXPO for RAM or manual CPU/GPU clocks), revert to default speeds to evaluate if stability returns.

Advanced Fixes for Persistent Crashes

- **Disable Fullscreen Optimizations:** Windows tries to enhance borderless windowed and fullscreen modes, which can cause micro-stutters and crashes. Right-click `csgo.exe`, go to *Compatibility*, and check **Disable fullscreen optimizations**.
- **Perform a Clean Reinstall:** Sometimes files are too corrupted for a basic verification. Completely uninstall the game, by hand erase the leftover Counter-Strike Global Offensive folder in the Steam directory, and download a fresh copy.
- **Examine Virtual Memory (Pagefile):** If Windows runs out of RAM, it uses storage space as virtual memory. Guarantee the pagefile is set to "System Managed" on your primary SSD.

Q1: Can third-party faceit or matchmaking clients trigger CS: GO to crash?

A: Yes. Overlay software application, third-party anti-cheats (like FACEIT AC), and taping software application (like Discord Overlay or GeForce Experience ShadowPlay) can hook into the video game engine and cause disputes. Attempt disabling all overlays if experiencing random crashes.

Q2: Why does my game crash particularly when packing into a map?
