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A healthy septic system is a quiet partner. When it works, you barely think about it. When it stops working, you think of little else. A backup on a holiday weekend, a soggy spot over the drain field, a whiff of sulfur near the tank cover, these issues carry real costs and a reasonable amount of tension.
