When Facepunch introduces new skins to the main Item Store every Thursday, players acquire them directly from Steam at a repaired cost. When purchased, these items have a one-week trade constraint. After that week expires, gamers can trade them with pals or sell them on the **Steam Community Market** for Steam Wallet funds.

This develops a vibrant marketplace dictated by supply and demand. Unusual skins, ceased items, and those preferred by popular content creators can increase in value.

Secret Factors Influencing Skin Prices

- **Supply:** How many copies of the skin were purchased throughout its time in the main store. Low-supply items often value in value.
- **Demand:** Is the skin aesthetically pleasing? Does it use tactical benefits (like camouflage)?

- **Glow-in-the-Dark Skins:** Items with subtle glowing elements allow players to navigate their base or discover doors in pitch-black night cycles without requiring a flashlight.
