The Wear and Tear System: Float Values Explained

Among the most fascinating aspects of CS: GO skins is that no two identical weapons look exactly the same. Every weapon is designated a **Float Value** ranging from **0.00 to 1.00**, which identifies its physical condition or outside wear.

The wear value is completely locked to the item when it is generated and does not deteriorate even more through usage.

The Five Exterior Conditions:

1. **Factory New (FN):** Float 0.00-- 0.07. Pristine, perfect surface with very little to no scratches.
2. **Minimal Wear (MW):** Float 0.07-- 0.15. Small blemishes or slight scuffs, normally only noticeable upon close assessment.
3. **Field-Tested (FT):** Float 0.15-- 0.38. Visible wear and scratches, stabilizing price and visual fidelity.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** Float 0.38-- 0.45. Considerable paint breaking and heavy wear patterns.

- 5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Greatly broken down, sometimes looking rusted, weathered, or almost entirely removed of paint.

Note: Certain skins-- such as the well-known AWP|Asiimov-- do not spawn in Factory New condition, making their most affordable possible wear states exceptionally unusual and important.

How the Economy Works

The economy surrounding these digital assets runs similarly to a real-world stock market. Prices are dictated simply by supply and need, affected by several key elements:

- **Pro Player Usage:** If a prominent esports expert starts utilizing a particular skin throughout a significant tournament, the need for that product generally increases over night.
- **Case Availability:** As Valve stops dropping particular older cases actively, the supply of those cases-- and the skins included within them-- decreases, triggering rates to increase naturally gradually.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can sell ten weapons of one rarity tier for one weapon of the next greater tier, burning items out of blood circulation and completely altering supply chains.
- **Operation Releases:** Valve-sponsored operations introduce brand-new thematic collections, briefly flooding or shifting the focus of the market.
