

## **Why You Should Visit Fulton, NY from Syracuse**

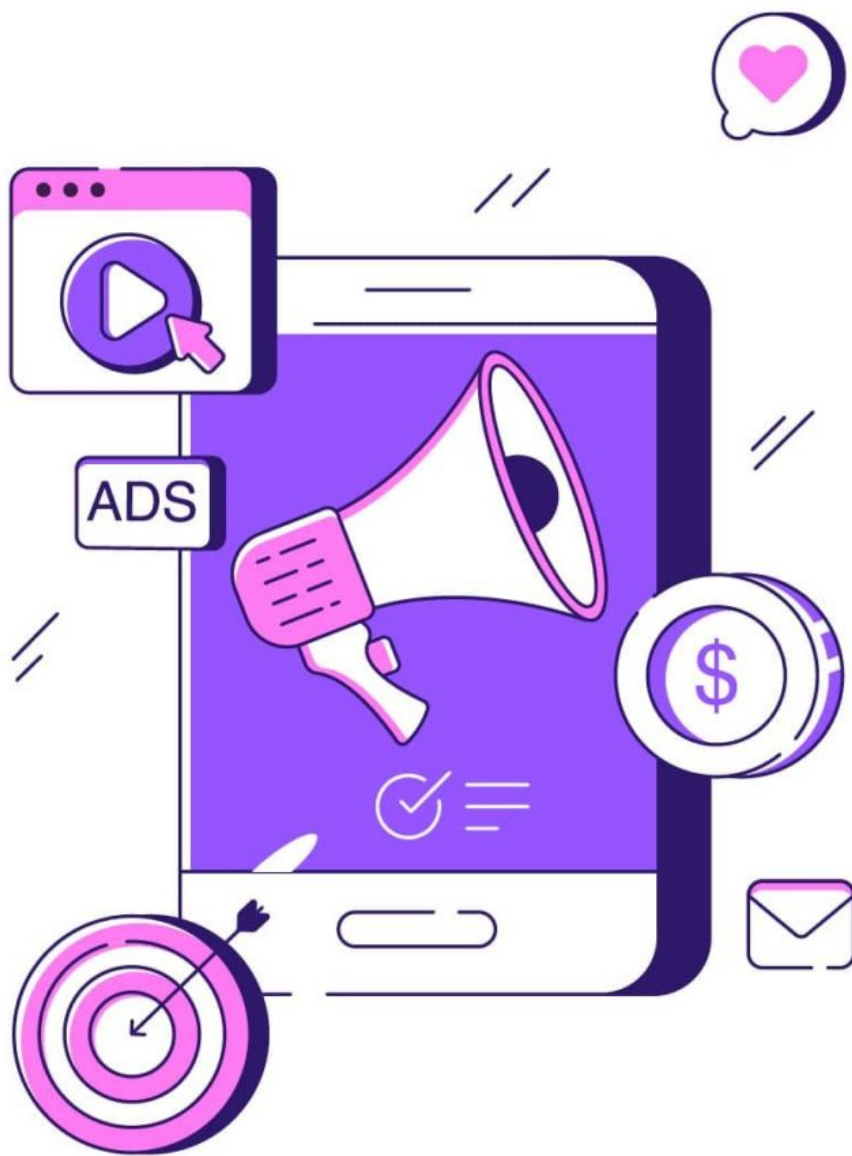
