

Bayshore in Miami Beach is the kind of neighborhood people often know before they can name it. They have driven past its broad streets, noticed the mature palms, crossed through it on the way to the beach or the Causeway, or walked near its golf course and hotel-lined edges without stopping to sort out where one part of Miami Beach ends and another begins. That is part of its character. Bayshore does not shout.
