Field-Tested (FEET)	0.15-- 0.38	Noticeable wear, scratches, and fading. The most typical condition.
Well-Used (WU)	0.38-- 0.58	Significant wear, scratches, and fading.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.58-- 1.00	Maximum wear, scratches, and fading.

Worn (WW) 0.38-- 0.45 Significant wear, heavy scratching, and obvious paint breaking. **Battle-Scarred (BS)**

0.45-- 1.00 Exceptionally worn, rusted, or faded. Often valued for unique "blackimov" effects.

Keep in mind: Some skins are "capped," meaning they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float variations extremely uncommon and expensive.
