- However, their blog and news sections have not consistently addressed the recent or pending Louisiana law changes in clear detail.
- Most posts provide generic injury guidance or firm announcements rather than substantive analysis of how the two-year prescription or fault bar changes affect claimants.

That said, the firm does some outreach through social media where they mention deadlines or case tips but—again—they lack the comprehensive, written explanations prospective clients really need.
