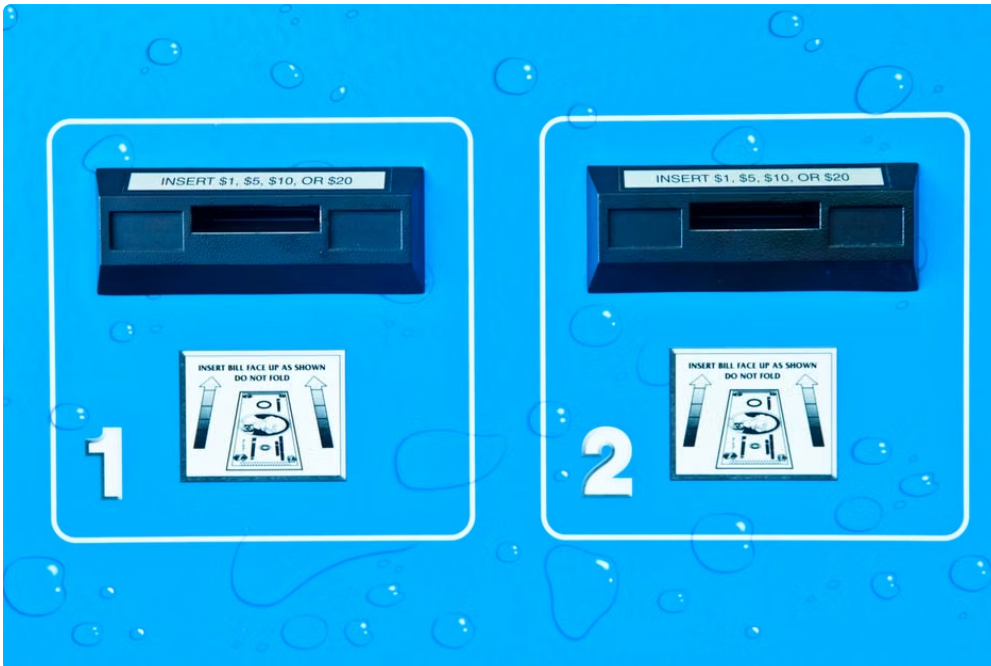

2. How Do Cluster Pays Count Wins?

Remember, each cluster pays independently unless a single cluster merges multiple symbols for a higher payout. Clusters that do not meet the minimum adjacency requirement don't pay.

This randomness is why you might occasionally see clusters form in quick succession or encounter long stretches without cluster wins. Any assumption otherwise falls into the gambler’s fallacy—believing past results influence future outcomes.

Beware of Pattern-Chasing

Cluster pays specifically discourage pattern-chasing because adjacency is less predictable than paylines. Unlike traditional slots where you might watch for “near misses” or promising paylines, cluster formation is a matter of pure chance within the grid.

Remember: No strategy or system can influence cluster formation, so always approach gameplay with this perspective to avoid frustration or false guarantees.
