

Planning a destination wedding or business trip with formalwear? One of the biggest stressors I see often is figuring out how to bring a suit along safely without checking it — and whether you can bring a suit bag *plus* a carry-on suitcase on the plane. As an 11-year wedding editor and seasoned traveler who hauls formalwear across climates and airline corridors, I have some solid advice to share on this topic.

Why You *Never* Check a Suit — Treat It as a Timeline Item

First things first: **do not check your suit.** I repeat, never ever checked a suit. Why? Checked luggage goes through a harsh journey with rough handling, tight folding, and often moisture or confusion. Your carefully pressed blazer or tux jacket will not appreciate being stuffed into that dark, tumbling cargo hold.

Treat the suit like a timeline item in your wedding or event day. For example:

- **Two days before departure:** Steam and press the suit thoroughly. Pack it carefully in a garment bag.
- **Day of travel:** Carry the suit bag onboard with you — make this one of your highest-priority items.
- **Upon arrival:** Hang the suit immediately and steam again if needed.

By embedding your suit care into your travel timeline, you reduce the risk of last-minute panic and wrinkled disaster.

How Garment Bag Counts Against Carry-On Allowance

5. **Bring a handheld steamer:** Fit it alongside your shoes, not inside the garment bag to avoid accidental creases.
