By 2015 and 2016, CS: GO gambling reached a fever pitch. Uncontrolled sites turned up over night, greatly promoted by popular YouTubers and Twitch streamers-- typically without revealing financial ties to the platforms.

This lack of oversight led to major debates, including claims of rigged odds and minor gambling.

Valve's Crackdown

In July 2016, Valve provided an enormous cease-and-desist wave targeting over 20 significant gambling sites, mentioning that these operations violated the Steam Subscriber Agreement. While this momentarily stunted the market, the environment rapidly adapted by introducing peer-to-peer (P2P) trading systems and cryptocurrency integration to bypass direct Steam API constraints.

Popular Types of CS: GO Gambling Platforms
