1. The Wild West Era (2013-- 2019)

In the early years, keys were totally liquid. *Note: There is also roughly a 10% chance that any dropped product will feature **StatTrak**™ technology, which tracks the number of kills made with that weapon.*

How to Acquire CS2 Case Keys

For players looking to dive into unboxing, there are 2 main methods to get keys, each with unique benefits and disadvantages.

- **In-Game Store (Direct Purchase)**
 - *Cost:* ~ £ 2.50 GBP (differs a little by local currency).
 - *Pros:* Always offered, straight from Valve, entirely safe.
 - *Cons:* Non-tradable and non-marketable.
- **Steam Community Market (Older/Specific Keys)**
 - *Cost:* Varies based on supply and demand.
 - *Pros:* Access to tradition operation secrets (if any are still valuable).
 - *Cons:* Often priced greater than £ 2.50 due to collector worth.

Are Case Keys a Good Investment?

For years, skilled traders dealt with CS: GO keys as a safe-haven asset. Due to the fact that Valve kept the base rate pinned at £ 2.50, holding keys seemed like holding money that was connected to the game's community.

However, considering that the 2019 trade lock upgrade, **secrets are no longer practical investment vehicles for the typical gamer.**

- You can not quickly cash them out.

Suggestion: Treat keys strictly as entertainment. Purchase them if you want the excitement of opening a case, but never ever see unboxing as a reliable way to generate income.

Often Asked Questions (FAQ)

Can I still trade CS: GO type in CS2?

No. Any keys bought from the in-game shop or gotten through specific updates after October 2019 are permanently untradable and unmarketable. Older legacy secrets purchased prior to the upgrade keep their tradability, but command a heavy collector's markup.

What happened to my old CS: GO secrets?

Your old keys did not vanish. When Valve upgraded the game to Counter-Strike 2, all tradition keys, cases, and weapon skins effectively transferred to your [csgo cases](#) CS2 stock. They function in CS2 exactly as they performed in CS: GO.

Can I use a CS2 key on any case?

While the days of using keys as a universal currency are long gone, they remain a staple of the Counter-Strike experience in CS2.
