Once the technician identifies the failed component, the real cost picture emerges. A refrigerant charge in a refrigerator might run \$150 to \$250 for the part and labor combined, while a compressor replacement can cost \$400 to \$600 because the compressor itself is an expensive sealed component. Washing machine drum seals, pump assemblies, and motor bearings each fall into different price brackets. A drain pump might cost \$120 to \$200 installed, while a complete drum replacement runs far higher. Dryer heating elements range from \$80 to \$200 depending on the model, and thermal fuses cost less but require proper diagnosis to avoid repeat failures.



What consumers often don't realize is that parts pricing depends on the appliance brand, model, age, and whether original manufacturer parts are available. Sourcing OEM (original equipment manufacturer) parts for a refrigerator from 2010 costs more than sourcing them for a 2022 model because older inventory is less common.
