The Betting and Gaming Act 1960 & Its Unintended Outcomes

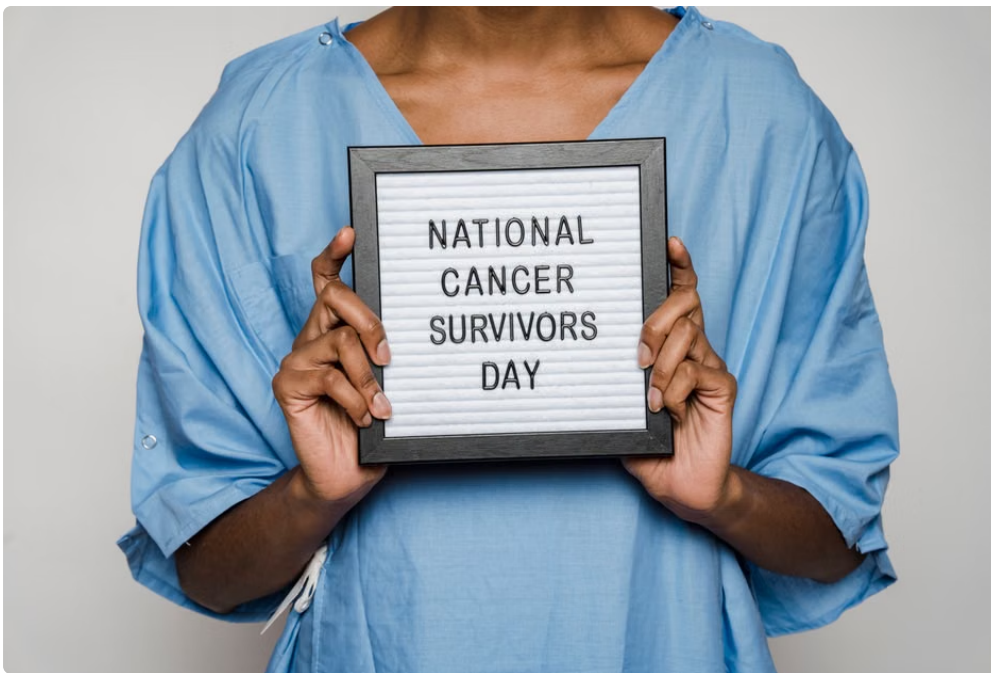
