This is where experience becomes visible. A less careful approach can create repeat service calls. A better approach identifies whether the system is dealing with a one-time failure or a pattern. If a breaker keeps tripping, the fix may not be limited to the breaker itself. If the blower motor overheats, the issue could be in the ductwork, the filter, the motor itself, or the control board. Installation deserves more respect than it usually gets

Then there is the ductwork. If ducts are leaking into an attic or crawl space, the system loses conditioned air before it ever reaches the room.
