3. **Choice:** Facepunch curates a weekly batch of accepted skins.

4. **The Item Store:** Every Thursday, a new batch of skins is launched on the official Rust Item Store for a repaired, low cost (normally ranging from £ 0.99 to £ 3.00).

Once bought from the official shop, these items have a one-week trade and market constraint. After that week, they enter the Steam Community Market, where supply and need determine their real value.
