High (Depends on the portion of the pot owned) **Case Opening** Imitates the official Valve case openings, typically with greater or personalized odds and special prize pools. High (Typically unfavorable return to gamer ratios) **Esports Betting** Wagering skins or money on expert CS: GO/CS2 matches (e.g., ESL Pro League, Majors) based on live odds. Skill/Knowledge-dependent (Moderate danger)
