- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavy damage, often revealing totally different textures)

Certain skins look extraordinary even in Battle-Scarred condition (typically called "blackimovs"), while others look horrible unless they are Factory New. Float value plays a massive function in figuring out an item's secondary market value.
