

## Introduction

**Note:** House edge is the percentage the operator avoids the pot. Lower edge normally translates to better worth for gamers, but other factors (withdrawal speed, community trust) likewise matter.

- **Bankroll Management**



- Set a set budget plan per session (e.g., 5% of total bankroll).
