4. **The Steam Community Market:** Once purchased, items enter a 7-day trade cooldown, after which players can buy, sell, or trade them easily on the Steam Community Market.

The Economics of Rust Skins

Unlike lots of games where cosmetic items are bound to a player's account permanently, Rust skins possess real-world liquidity via the Steam Wallet (and third-party marketplaces, though caution is encouraged). Rates change based upon supply, need, and overall player count.

Certain uncommon skins have achieved legendary status, commanding hundreds or perhaps thousands of dollars. The economy is driven by deficiency; as soon as a weekly shop rotation ends, Facepunch hardly ever re-releases those specific items, implying the total supply is forever topped.
