As highlighted above, your home or the RNG (Random Number Generator) determines when a crash takes place. A round can crash immediately at 1.00 x, ruining anybody who did not react in milliseconds.

Why Do Players Risk Their Skins?

The skin economy operates differently than fiat currency. To many players, a digital knife worth £ 300 feels less tangible than a £ 300 expense in their physical wallet. This abstraction of worth reduces the psychological barrier to betting. Additionally, skin crash sites provide a number of distinct features:

- **Accessibility:** Anyone with a Steam account and a couple of low-tier weapon surfaces can get involved.
- **Speed:** Rounds last anywhere from a few seconds to less than a minute, providing instantaneous gratification.
