4. Valve's Crackdowns and Ban Waves

Valve has actually made it clear that commercial gambling breaches the Steam Subscriber Agreement. Throughout the years, the developer has performed massive ban waves targeting the bot accounts used by these sites, **Click here for more** leading to millions of dollars worth of skins being permanently locked or rendered untradeable.

- **Beware of "Free Promo" Scams:** Many phishing sites mimic popular gambling brand names, providing phony discount codes to take Steam login credentials or API keys. Never ever log into third-party sites using unproven links.
- **Protect your API Key:** Scammers frequently utilize malicious browser extensions or phishing links to take your Steam API secret, permitting them to obstruct and cancel your legitimate trades.
