- **Jackpot:** Players pool their skins into a central pot. Each skin adds to the player's "tickets." A random draw chooses a winner, with higher-value contributions yielding a much better analytical opportunity of winning.

### How CS2 Gambling Works: The Mechanics

Understanding the underlying mechanics helps demystify how these websites function. Historically, skin gambling relied on Steam API combination, permitting bots to [Additional resources](#) help with trade deals.
