

What are the signs if mice are in my North York attic?

A mouse infestation in the attic often begins quietly, then becomes easier to spot once rodent activity rises. Common signs of mice include mouse droppings near insulation, [discount pest control toronto](#) along joists, or around stored items, plus gnaw marks on wood, cardboard, and even electrical materials.
