In the UK, certain medicines—like medical cannabis—often require a prescription from a specialist doctor. But what if the clinic you visit offers a prescription from a doctor who is not on the General Medical Council (GMC) Specialist Register? One client recently told me was shocked by the final bill.. Exactly.. The CQC monitors healthcare providers to ensure they deliver safe and effective care.

Clinics registered with the CQC are required to employ suitable staff and maintain clinical governance standards. If a clinic offers prescriptions from doctors not on the specialist register when specialist expertise is expected, this can be a *red flag* about regulatory compliance and quality of care.

How Does the CQC Oversight Affect You?

If a clinic is registered and inspected by the CQC, you can check their reports online. These reports may mention whether the clinic has the right expertise to prescribe certain medicines effectively and safely. A clinic ignoring specialist prescribing rules risks poor ratings or enforcement action, which should be a warning to patients.

Who Is Legally Allowed to Prescribe Specialist Medicines?

In the UK, any medical doctor registered with the GMC can legally prescribe most medicines. However, the **rules around unlicensed and specialist medicines** are stricter. Many treatments, such as medical cannabis, are

regulated with guidance that prescriptions should come from doctors with specialist qualifications relevant to the condition treated.

Prescribing from a doctor who is not a recognised specialist may breach internal NHS and private clinic guidelines, impact patient safety, and potentially be a *disqualifying irregularity* if found by regulators.

What is a Disqualifying Irregularity?

A disqualifying irregularity is a serious failure in a healthcare professional's conduct or competence that can lead to sanctions or removal from the GMC Register. Prescribing outside one's scope of expertise may lead to this, especially if it causes harm.



Unlicensed Medicines and the Need for Risk Disclosure

Many specialist treatments, including some formulations of medical cannabis, are **unlicensed medicines** in the UK. This means they have not gone through full regulatory approval for general use. Because such medicines carry inherent risks, regulations require:

- Clear risk disclosure to patients.
- A prescribing doctor with the competence to assess those risks.
- Close monitoring and follow-up.

If a doctor who is not registered as a specialist issues such a prescription, they may not fully understand or communicate these risks appropriately.

How to Protect Yourself: Steps If a Clinic Offers You a Prescription from Someone Not on the Specialist Register

1. **Ask for the Registration Number:** Always ask the clinic or doctor for their GMC registration number and check it online at the GMC website to confirm their specialist registration status.
2. **Check the Specialist Register:** You can verify if the doctor is on the specialist register relevant to your treatment area by searching the GMC's specialist register [here](#).
3. **Request Details of Clinical Governance:** Ask the clinic about their CQC registration and when their last inspection was. You can also look up their reports at the CQC website [here](#).
4. **Inquire About Unlicensed Medicine Risks:** If the prescription involves unlicensed medicines, ask how risks will be explained and managed.
5. **Seek a Second Opinion:** When in doubt, consult your GP or another recognised specialist before starting treatment.
6. **Report Concerns:** If you believe a clinic is not following rules—such as prescribing outside specialist competence—report them to the CQC or GMC.
