

Batavia's Climate at a Glance

Batavia, NY sits in Genesee County between Rochester and Buffalo along the I-90 corridor, and that location affects daily weather more than many visitors realize. The city has a **humid continental climate**, which means four distinct seasons, noticeable **temperature swings**, and plenty of year-to-year **weather variability**. Winters are cold enough for regular snow and ice, summers can feel muggy, and spring and fall often bring fast shifts in conditions.

Because Batavia is inland, it does not get the same direct moderation from Lake Ontario that shoreline communities see. Even so, the larger western New York pattern still matters. Systems moving off the lake can feed broader regional weather, and **lake-effect weather** can sometimes reach the corridor between Rochester, Batavia, and Buffalo. 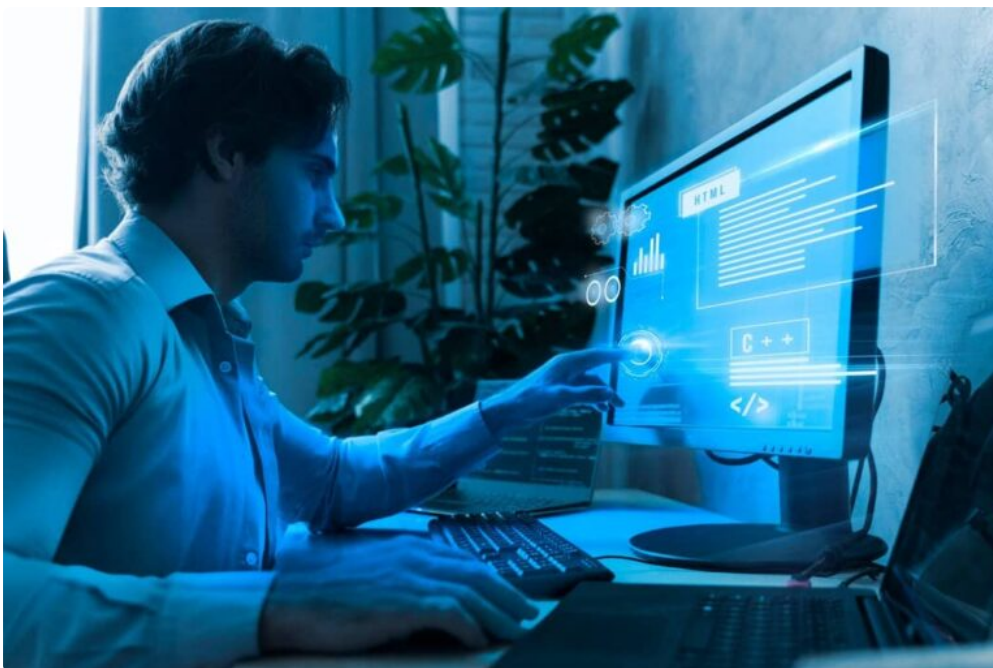
