- **Grenade Lineups:** Smoke, flash, and fragmentation grenade trajectories can be interfered with by irregular shapes like damaged aircraft wings or spread cargo.
- **Lighting and Contrast:** Burning wreckage releases vibrant lighting and smoke particles, which can obscure gamer models (representatives) wearing certain camouflage skins.
