- **The Martingale System:** A traditional betting technique where a gamer doubles their bet after every loss. The theory is that a single win will recuperate all previous losses plus an earnings equivalent to the original base bet. However, this needs a huge bankroll and can quickly hit website betting limitations.
- **The Reverse Martingale (Paroli):** Players double their bets after a *win* instead of a loss, trying to ride a winning streak while keeping losses decreased to the base bet quantity.
- **The Moonshot Strategy:** Placing small bets with the objective of holding out for massive multipliers (50x, 100x, or higher). This works similar to playing the lotto.
