3. Roulette

Comparable to traditional gambling establishment roulette, but normally adjusted with 3 results (red, black, and green/multiplier) represented by CS2 skin colors or group logo designs.



4. Coinflip

A simple 1v1 game where 2 gamers wager skins or credits of roughly equivalent value. The system turns a virtual coin, and the winner takes the entire pot (minus a small site commission, understood as the "rake").

5. Jackpot

Numerous players deposit skins into a central pool. A virtual timer counts down, and a winner is picked via a lottery system. The greater the worth of the skins a gamer deposits, the greater their statistical opportunity of winning the whole pot.

Security, Risks, and Security Measures

Since CS2 gambling sites operate beyond Valve's direct control, users need to exercise severe care. Engaging with these platforms brings a number of significant threats:

- **Scams and Phishing:** Fake websites typically mimic popular gambling platforms to take Steam login qualifications or high-tier inventory items.
