Exceptionally variable; normally prefers your house greatly. **Coinflip** A simple 1v1 PvP video game where 2 gamers wager skins of approximately equal value. A virtual coin is flipped, and the winner takes the entire pot. 50/50 chances, minus a small platform commission (rake). **Jackpot** Numerous players contribute skins to a central pot. Each skin's worth identifies the player's "ticket" share. A spinner chooses one winner who takes whatever. Based on the overall worth contributed; platform takes a portion fee.
